September's Unemployment Rate Drops to 11.8 Percent

Nevada's Unemployment rate fell to 11.8 percent in September, a decline from 12.1 percent in August and a significant improvement from September 2011's reading of 13.6 percent. September's household survey showed more Nevadans are working, partly contributing to the decline in the rate of unemployment, said Bill Anderson, chief economist for Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation (DETR). The rate equates to a seasonally adjusted 161,600 individuals still unemployed. The number of Nevadans out of work fell by 4,300 in September, which is partly due to some falling out of the workforce, as well as people obtaining employment.

Governor Brian Sandoval said, "I am encouraged by this month's job growth and the slight decrease in the unemployment rate. I am also pleased that export activity is up one-third over last year and that Nevada is taking an increased role in the world's economy. This news further validates our efforts to reach out to foreign countries, which we will continue to do."

Amongst the state's three largest population centers, the Las Vegas metro area is home to the highest unemployment rate in the state, at 11.5 percent, not seasonally adjusted. This is down from 12.3 percent in August and, more importantly, 14 percent a year ago. In Reno/Sparks the rate fell 0.7 point, to 10.8 percent. A year ago, the region's jobless rate stood at 12.9 percent. Carson City is home to a 10.9 percent rate, down from 11.5 percent in August and 12.8 percent last year.

"The news is encouraging, as a year ago, there were an estimated 188,300 Nevadans counted as unemployed, "Anderson said. "Monthly measures are subject to wide swings, and it is perhaps best not too put too much weight behind that volatility; however, when evaluated as a whole, the economy is slowly moving in a positive direction."

Typically during the month, about 7,500 jobs (not seasonally adjusted) are added in the state, the majority of them in the public sector coinciding with the start of a new academic year. This year, however, 14,600 jobs were added, resulting in a seasonally adjusted gain of 7,100. Through the first three quarters of the year, private sector jobs are up by more than 12,000 compared to the same period last year.

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¹ Unemployment rates for the State's metropolitan areas and counties reported here are not adjusted for seasonality. Hence, comparisons to the State's seasonally adjusted rate should be avoided. Legitimate comparisons, however, can be made to the State's unadjusted rate – 11.2 percent in September, down from 12 percent in August and 13.6 percent in September 2011.

Additionally, more jobs are expected to be added during the holiday season, making modest gains over last year, Anderson said. From September to December 2011, Nevada added 4,100 jobs, however prior to the recession, seasonal job gains approached 9,000 during the holiday hiring period.

NEVADA LABOR MARKET OVERVIEW September 2012

Following some relatively weak news in recent months. September's labor market report highlights some more positive trends in Nevada. Employment is up and the jobless rate tumbled, trends very much in line with national norms for the month. While overall results are encouraging, it is best not to put too much weight behind these findings, just as we cautioned against reading too much into prior months' weakness. When the monthly volatility is "averaged out," the predominant trend remains one of modest improvement, with much ground still left to be made up.


These general conclusions, as they pertain to the labor market, are consistent with other measures of the economy's health. For instance, after declining in seven straight quarters, personal income in Nevada has been on the rise in each of the past eight periods. Still, income levels remain below readings from 2007 and

Certainly, the most-watched barometer of the labor market's health is the monthly unemployment rate, an estimate driven, in part, by a nationwide household

survey. In Nevada, the jobless rate reached an all-time high of 14 percent in October 2010. A year ago, in September 2011, it was at 13.6 percent. The most recent reading for this September has come in at 11.8 percent, down 0.3 percentage point from the prior month. This comes on the heels of monthly increases in both July and August.

The good news is that the decline was facilitated, at least in part, by an increase in employment amongst Nevadans, as measured by the monthly household survey. (Typically, when we focus on employment in our monthly overviews, we utilize the results of a monthly survey of business establishments, as we will do below.)

Coupled with a slight reduction in the labor force, the end result was a decline in the number of unemployed of 4,300 for the month, to a seasonally adjusted 161,600. A year ago, there were an estimated 188,300 Nevadans counted as unemployed. In addition, initial claims for unemployment fell sharply in September, to its lowest level in five years, an encouraging sign looking forward. At just under 14,000 for the month, initial claims activity was well off of recessionary highs, which exceeded 36,000 on a monthly basis.


Payroll employment in Nevada totaled a seasonally adjusted 1.14 million in September. Typically during the month, about 7,500 jobs


(not seasonally adjusted) are added in the State, the majority of them in the public sector coinciding with the start of a new academic year. This year, however, 14,600 jobs were added, resulting in a seasonally adjusted gain of 7,100.

The government sector did add 7,800 jobs in September, about 700 more than anticipated. The majority of these jobs, as expected, came in local government. At the same time, several private sector industry groups also added employment. The largest increase came in professional/business services, which turned in a seasonally adjusted gain of 2,500. Financial activities added 1,200 positions. (Furthermore, these establishments added jobs on a year-over-year basis for the first time in approximately five years.) Trade/transportation/utilities contributed 800 new jobs. Even the construction sector added jobs during the month, about 1,500 after seasonal adjustment, but the overall trend is still one of continued

moderate job declines, or stable employment levels, at best.

This positive news is not a one-time occurrence. In fact, through the first three quarters of the year, private sector jobs are up by more than 12,000 compared to the same period last year. This is on top of a similar gain turned in for all of 2011. Most industries are





contributing to the uptrend. The major exception is construction (down 3,700 during the first nine months of this year vs. the same period last year). Smaller losses have been turned in by financial activities (despite September's more encouraging news) and manufacturing.

Although the manufacturing sector has struggled of late, one of the bright spots in the State's overall economic performance has been export activity. So far this year, the value of exports is up by about onethird from a year ago, in totaling \$6.6 billion through August. Since the first half of 2009, exports are up by 70 percent. Primary metals manufacturing is the State's largest export industry, in terms of value. From the first half of 2009 until the first half of this year, primary metals exports rose from \$1.6 billion to \$2.5 billion.

With the approaching holiday-related uptick in retail activity, this month we examine the likely impacts on hiring. In the years prior to the recession, September-December increases in retail trade jobs approached 9,000 in

Nevada. Since then, while still positive, these gains have eased. For instance, in 2011, retail employment rose by 4,100 from September through December. In that the economy has strengthened a bit from a year ago, our expectations are for growth to be slightly higher than last year's gain.


An examination of recent job trends by establishment size

highlights some interesting trends. In general, the State's largest establishments were hit harder and quicker during the early stages of the recession. The State's smaller establishments did not begin cutting payrolls until 2008. Over the 2006-2012 period, the State's largest establishments have shed more than 60,000 jobs. Employment in the smallest establishments (less than 20 employees) is actually up by 6,000.

At the sub-State level, while not directly comparable to the State information reported above, non-seasonally adjusted unemployment rates fell in 15 of 17 Nevada counties over the August-September period, and held steady in another. Nye and Lincoln Counties each recorded a percentage point decline. Several other counties recorded a decline of 0.8 point.

Amongst the State's three largest population centers, the Las Vegas metro area is home to the highest unemployment rate in the State, at 11.5 percent, not seasonally


adjusted.1 This is down from 12.3 percent in August and, more importantly, 14 percent a year ago. In Reno/Sparks the rate fell 0.7 point, to 10.8 percent. On the jobs front, perhaps the most notable development is, arguably, a relatively solid showing on the part of the Reno metro area. Specifically, about 1,000 new jobs (not seasonally adjusted) were expected in September, based on typical seasonal patterns. However, 2,500 jobs were actually added. The end result is a seasonally adjusted

gain of 1,500. Little change was evident in the Las Vegas and Carson City markets. For the first nine months of the year, however, southern Nevada has added 5.500 jobs compared to the same period a year ago. Reno employment is unchanged from a year ago, while payrolls in Carson City

> establishments are down slightly.



At the national level, 114,000 jobs were added in September. Just as importantly, prior months were revised upward (+40,000 in July and +46,000 in August). Nevada's monthly job estimates are also subject to month-ago revisions. (For instance, preliminary August estimates reported last month were revised down

by 1,500.) More importantly, however, is the annual "benchmarking" process conducted early every calendar year. During this process, the monthly estimates are benchmarked to reflect comprehensive counts from state

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unemployment insurance tax records. The Bureau of Labor Statistics has recently announced that preliminary estimates suggest that private sector payrolls are expected to be revised up by 450,000, nationwide, as a result of the benchmark. In Nevada, our monthly job estimates appear to be quite consistent with the more comprehensive unemployment insurance records, at least in total. As a result, our current opinion is that the benchmark process in early-2013 will result in relatively minor and, hopefully, slightly positive revisions.

Nevada's largest industry, in terms of employment, is leisure/hospitality. Through the first three quarters of

the year, job levels in this sector are up by 7,000 relative to a year ago. Continued gains in these establishments are certainly dependent upon the willingness of individuals to visit Nevada and spend their disposable incomes. Hence, consumer confidence and sentiment are key indicators tracked by many in Nevada. Although volatile from month-to-month, measures of consumer confidence (from the Conference Board) and sentiment (from the University of Michigan) are trending up over time, and both turned in noticeable increases in September. Still, both barometers remain below pre-recessionary readings.
