AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF CLARK, STATE OF NEVADA, REGULATING THE POSSESSION OF WEAPONS AND FIREARMS CAPABLE OF BEING CONCEALED, WITHIN THE COUNTY OF CLARK, STATE OF NEVADA, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREINWITH, FIXING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION HEREOF AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO.

The Board of County Commissioners of Clark County, Nevada, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is hereby made unlawful for any person to carry upon his person a concealed weapon of any kind or description, including a knife with a blade of three inches or more, a gun, pistol, revolver or other firearm, within the County of Clark without first having received written permission from the Sheriff of Clark County.

Section 2. The above account shall not be construed to apply to Police Officers in the performance of their duty.

Section 3. It is hereby made unlawful for any person to own or have in his possession a gun, pistol, revolver, or other firearm capable of being concealed without first having registered it with the Sheriff of Clark County, State of Nevada.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, give away or permanently pass possession of a gun, pistol, revolver or other firearm without first having the weapon registered to the new owner thereof, with the Sheriff of Clark County, State of Nevada, by the seller, giver or person permanently passing possession thereof.

Section 5. A weapon capable of being concealed is hereby defined as follows: Any gun or firearm with a barrel whose length is fourteen inches or less or whose over-all length is eighteen inches or less,

Section 6. Every violation of this ordinance or any of the terms or provisions hereof shall constitute a misdemeanor and every person found guilty of any violation thereof shall be punished by fine of not more than \$500.00 or imprisoned in the Clark County jail for a term not exceeding six months or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
